Dear CTJ families,

This time of year brings so many new beginnings - new Jewish year, a new school year, new teachers, and new friends all provide us with fresh starts. As we bring our students back to in-person classes, it almost feels like I'm starting my first year at CTJ all over again. I'm excited to get to know our kids in person! Here's some other NEW beginnings coming up at CTJ's Ohren Education Center (OEC):

- * A block of time on Sunday mornings for grades 1-3 and on Wednesday afternoons for grades 3-6 that is just for community building with age level peers. After a year of being physically apart, we will pay special attention to rebuilding in-person relationships and social skills through team building activities, games, and conversations about our daily lives and the world around us.
- * New and expanded roles for teen leaders to work with younger students
- * A new chug (elective) choice Conversational Hebrew!
- * A totally reimagined Noar experience for grades 8-12

When you want to hear about these and other experiences your children are having at OEC, here is a list of questions that you might try asking since "What did you do today" seldom elicits an informative response:

- * What was the best part of your day?
- * If you were in charge of OEC today, what would you have kept the same? What would you have changed?
- * Tell me one thing you learned or that you thought about in a new way?
- * Did anyone help you with anything today? Did you help someone else with anything?

- * What was the most interesting thing you heard someone say? The weirdest?
- * Was there anything you didn't understand today?
- * Did anything surprise you today?
- * What made you smile today?
- * What made you frown today?
- * What made one of your teachers smile today? What made one of them frown?
- * Does anyone in your class seem like they need a friend?

Jonah & the Whale by Becca Tullman

At Yom Kippur, Jews read the story of Jonah. It's a pretty weird story, so let's recap.

Chapter 1

God is displeased about the crummy behavior of the people of Nineveh. They are not making good choices. So God instructs Jonah to go to Nineveh and prophesize God's impending destruction of their city if they don't knock it off. That sounds like a real drag to Jonah, so he hops on a boat to Tarshish, a city in the other direction. God causes a great storm so that the ship is in danger of capsizing. Obviously, the sailors assume that someone on the ship has angered their gods and those gods are expressing their annoyance with this storm. So everyone on the boat draws straws to see who they can blame. (Don't worry, our emergency response plan at CTJ is a bit more thoughtful!) Jonah draws the short straw and admits that it's his fault that God is royally ticked off. He says the only logical solution is to throw him overboard. The sailors aren't really digging this plan. They're pretty sure tossing people into the sea is displeasing to most gods, so they try to row out of the storm. God is having none of



that; eventually they do throw Jonah over the side, and the storm is ended.

Chapter 2

God causes a giant fish to swallow Jonah, and Jonah lives in its belly for three days. (God was clearly in an odd mood. The belly of a fish?) After Jonah sets up housekeeping in his new fishy home, he spends his days praying and singing psalms to God. He thanks God for not allowing him to die underwater and repents. When God feels certain that Jonah has learned his lesson, he allows him out of timeout by causing the fish to spew Jonah onto dry land. (We'll save conversation about the spiritual significance of spewing for another time, shall we? I've just eaten.)

Chapter 3

God tells Jonah to go to Nineveh and break the news that God will destroy their city in 40 days because of their wicked ways. (I imagine that just like everyone's parents, God said, "Don't make me repeat myself again!") Jonah rolls his eyes but decides not to test God's patience any further and trudges off to Nineveh with the message. The Ninevites believe him without even asking him to turn a staff into a snake as proof (á lá Moses); and they immediately decide to repent. Easy peasy! (Parents - does this work on your kids?) So God decides not to wipe them out.

Chapter 4

If you thought everyone lived happily ever after, think again. This is not a fairytale! Jonah is all in a tizzy. He's just over it. He claims this was the reason he ran away in the first place: because he knew God was going to forgive everyone anyway and the whole errand was a waste of time. He's like, "Really God? Just kill me now!" in his best

exasperated-teenager voice. Rolling his eyes again, Jonah wanders off to hang out in a makeshift hut. Apparently, he has no life. God, who has by now developed a taste for teaching lessons through pranks, causes a tall plant to grow overnight by the hut to give Jonah cooling shade. But the night after, God sends a worm to attack the plant, so it withers, and a great wind to knock over the hut. The sun beats down on Jonah. He's hot and sweaty and, much like I do in Florida, he gets cranky. We can safely assume that, unlike Florida, the heat where Jonah was hanging out was a dry heat; but still, it was hot. For the second time in three days, Jonah goes all melodramatic and says, "Just kill me now, God!" God gets the last word in by saying, "Oh! You're THAT upset about this plant which appeared overnight and was destroyed the next night, but you don't get why I care about a city full of people who maybe just didn't know better?" And there the story ends. It's rather unsatisfying really. I would love to know if Jonah gets himself a life at some point!

In all seriousness, though, this odd little story can inspire some true soul searching. A colleague of mine once shared the following:

"I heard something from a very wise 90-year-old playwright, who told me that at some point in our lives, we are all faced with the choice of destination: Tarshish or Nineveh? Tarshish is the shirking of responsibility, the cop-out. Nineveh is the acceptance of destiny/purpose/mission. Every so often, we should stop and take stock, asking ourselves if we are going to Tarshish or Nineveh."

May we all be blessed with clarity of vision as we strive to fulfill our purpose in the year ahead, and may 5782 be filled with blessings.

Staying Safe, Wherever We Are

At CTJ, we take security very seriously, and we are constantly evaluating ways to keep our families as safe as possible, wherever we are. Our Security Committee, comprised of CTJ members with experience in law enforcement, medicine, and other diverse perspectives, meets regularly to identify new strategies, and security is a standing topic at our monthly Board meetings. But remember: Security is everyone's responsibility, and we need your help. Here are some changes we've made to keep you safe and ways you can contribute.

At Shul

What We've Done:

Made our building a tougher target through numerous physical security upgrades.

Reduced the threat of intruders with the OpenPath access control system.

Instituted a robust emergency plan. You might notice safety announcements at the start of services and periodic evacuation drills.

Launched a mass notification system. During an emergency, you'll receive texts and emails.

How You Can Help:

Keep the doors closed and make sure they lock. Do not let someone follow you into the synagogue, especially if you do not know them.

Make sure your contact information is updated in Shulcloud - mobile numbers and emails - so we can notify you during an emergency.

Volunteer to be on our team of greeters. You'll receive professional training in emergency procedures and safety protocols. Must be 18 or older. Email office@ctimb.org to join.

Online

What We've Done:

Secured our Zoom events and services with unique passwords

Monitored online events to ensure we know everyone on the call. If we cannot identify a participant, we remove them.

How You Can Help:

Do not forward Zoom links to others. Want to invite a friend? Simply email Tamah at office@ctjmb.org to have the link sent directly.

Use a screen name that we can recognize, especially if you're camera shy.

At School

What We've Done:

Instituted new lockdown training and procedures – all school doors will be locked while school is in session. Students will need to enter through the back parking lot, and this door will be locked 10 minutes after school begins.

Provided emergency response and hostile intruder training to all teachers and staff.

Developed a regular schedule for emergency drills.

Created special emergency plans and notification systems for off-site retreats.

How You Can Help:

Arrive and depart school on time. If you need to drop off your child a few minutes early, let Becca Tullman know in advance, beccatullman@ctjmb.org. We'll provide a safe space for your child until class begins. It's

important we know who is in the building at all times.

Make sure to provide emergency contact information and update us if there are changes.

At the Beach, Park, and Other Locations

What We've Done:

Created site-specific emergency plans for all the fun places we gather.

Identified reunification locations in case we get separated - listen for safety

instructions at the start of events.

Developed a portable emergency kit with first aid supplies and provisions.

How You Can Help:

Be aware of your surroundings and understand the safety instructions.


