


GETTING READY FOR THE NEW YEAR





Rabbi's Reflections

There is a beautiful teaching in the Talmud based on the concept of what the rabbis call a "hora'at sha'ah – literally: an urgent moment" which gives the leaders of a community emergency power because of an unprecedented time. One example they give of a hora'at sha'ah is when non-Jewish members of the city are hungry, you must let them come and pick food from your fields (when normally such an obligation traditionally did not exist in Jewish law). What is INCREDIBLE about this concept is that on most occasions, the rules created during these times of "emergency" remained in effect forever.

I have been thinking a lot about this teaching as we approach the High Holy Days, our first Rosh Hashanah & Yom Kippur back in person in three years. I am so excited to once again look out at our synagogue members, gathered together for this sacred season, not just over a computer screen (though there will be that option but with limited interaction), but with all the ruach (spirit) that comes from a community singing and celebrating together. However, it is impossible not to consider the continued implementation of some of aspects of the Holy Days that were created during our *hora'at sha'ah*.

The staff has spent a lot of time pondering whether we should continue to use pre-recorded videos to enhance our High Holy Day music and experience, or should we continue to keep services shorter cutting out parts of the service that are more difficult to connect with; should we use musical instruments not just during the evening services but during the day as well, and do we engage those in attendance with a Kahoot or some other interactive moment using technology that we previously would abstain from? The difficult answer to any of these types of questions is that as a community there is such a broad range of answers. We have members who feel moved by services that are five hours long and others who want to be done by noon. We have members who would never bring a cell phone with them into a house of worship while others would love to use their device to interact during the service. We have those who love instrumental music and those who feel it is an impediment to their spiritual connection... you get the idea. It is impossible to make everyone happy.

The pandemic allowed us to use our imagination and resources to create an experience we never thought would be possible. How do we keep that ingenuity and creativity as we move back to some of the formality of pre-pandemic life? This is the question that is keeping me up at night... literally! I love the comfort of tradition and I love the excitement of modernity and I believe each of these aspects of Judaism has something meaningful to say to us. Personally, I found one of the most incredible additions to our High Holy Day experience was our memory board - the scrolling list of names, stories and reflections of your loved ones who are no longer with us. I felt as though I was invited into your family's past in a way that was very intimate and special. This is definitely an addition from our "urgent moment" that is going to stay with us.

Ultimately, I don't have a perfect answer to this dilemma, but I do know we are going to do our very best to give all of you as many meaningful moments as possible. More than anything, we are just excited to celebrate together. I don't know about you, but given the year I have had, I am definitely up for a celebration!

Wishing you and your loved ones a very happy and healthy High Holy Day season – and please please please, I know Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are important, but don't forget to dance with us at Simchat Torah too.

President's Message ••• Don't Tell Me, Show Me

Some of my most treasured memories of my father were the wisdom and lessons he would impart upon me, many of which he drew from Jewish teachings. One of the phrases I heard him use most often was, "don't tell me, show me" and he would say it whenever I told him I wanted to improve at a certain skill or quality. He was paraphrasing a nugget of truth from Pirkei Avot, which instructs us to "speak little, but do much." There are of course plenty of other famous iterations of this idea: "actions speak louder than words," or "just do it," in the case of a certain famous athletic brand; but my father's particular choice of words was significant, intentional. He wasn't simply making a vague statement about the value of deeds over promises. He was explicitly calling me to action, encouraging me in no uncertain terms to prove to him-and myself-that I was truly committed to achieving my goals. It's been a few years now since my father passed, but I've been ruminating on this valuable lesson recently as I look around at what's going on in the world and think about the role we all have to play in improving it.

We are now eight months into the secular new year and even further into the Jewish one. At the start of a new year in any culture, we all commit to making positive changes in our lives. Proclamations like,

"I'm going to lose 10 pounds this year!" or "I'm going to attend synagogue every week!" or "I'm going to donate more to charity" echo throughout our homes and communities as people vow to use the fresh start of a new year to improve themselves. But implicit in these pledges is a quiet acknowledgement that these resolutions are hard to stick to. They require time, energy, and sacrifice, and at times these resolutions can ask more of us than we feel we can give. We make these promises in the first place because they lead us to the reforms we want to see in our lives, but they require so much effort that sometimes we just don't commit to getting ourselves there. But perhaps that is the point. Perhaps the journey is a destination in itself, and the work required to achieve our goals—and all the trials and tribulations and lessons we encounter along it—is as valuable, if not more so, than the reward we receive at the end. The benefits of losing weight, for instance, go far beyond simply being thin: along the way you'll learn more about healthy eating, improving your relationship with yourself, and the power of hard work. As my father wisely told me, proving to yourself and others that you can do it is a victory in its own rite.

As we approach the Jewish holidays, let us all be intentional in setting our goals. Let us prioritize action over promises. And most importantly, let us remember that where you land isn't always what matters: what matters is the lessons you learn as you're getting yourself there.




