Usually, the September's TikvaTimes article is the easiest to write. Most years I find a text or quote that teaches about renewal or introspection, talk about how excited we are to be coming together at Martyrs for the holidays, and conclude with a wish for the New Year. This would have been my 18th High Holy Day newsletter article as a rabbi and at this point, it is pretty second nature.

However, this has been a year unlike any other. And, therefore, every article I have tried to write, every sermon I have been pondering, all seem to fall a bit flat. Either my message seems insignificant given the pandemic, my words can be construed as divisive given the political climate, or the depth of loss the new normal has brought is impossible to encapsulate in a short writing.

I hope you will find a bit of inspiration in some of my teachings during this season. I look forward to sharing the wisdom of our tradition, that after the last 4,000 years has seen a few history-changing moments. However, recently I found an article by Rabbi Harold Kushner that really intrigued me. He was having a debate with a physicist about Newton's second law, the tendency toward chaos, and whether it was an argument for or against the existence of God. Following an article he wrote about the debate, he received a letter from a biologist who claimed he should have spoken to a biologist instead of a physicist as he would have had a stronger case for God.

The biologist gave Rabbi Kushner a few examples - take a jar of marbles. Shake it and the marbles become totally mixed up. On the other hand, if you think about the growth of a human fetus, it starts with a group of undifferentiated cells, and after some weeks, some of those cells become eyes, some turn into lungs, fingers, etc. What was totally

random becomes orderly - the opposite of Newton's second law. In the case of the fetus, instead of moving from order toward chaos, it moves from chaos toward order. "That is God at work," wrote the biologist.

And maybe that is the message of the season. We are living in chaos (at least it often feels that way) – navigating an unprecedented medical crisis, facing incredibly destructive natural disasters, wondering about our country's future, worrying about our children's education and wellbeing, and thinking about those who are isolated, alone, and afraid. But, maybe the only way we can move through all of this and come to a sense of "Godliness" is by living life with intention and joining together as a community.

Over the past many months, the moments that have seemed the most "ordered" and meaningful are the ones where we have been a CTJ community: creating a rhythm to the week (Shabbat & holidays), where we have found ways to assist those in need (the many tzedakah opportunities we have completed), and when we have learned together and laughed together (the wonderful classes and activities we have shared).

I do look forward to sharing the New Year with all of you in a very different way. We have been hard at work as to what it can look like given our constraints and are excited at the possibility. It is my hope that as you come on this journey with us, that you find moments you love and that bring some order to the chaos. And, for those moments you like less, I hope you will remember that we are all doing this for the first time and hopefully building a new Jewish experience that will be talked about and built upon for many, many years to come.

Shanah tovah - here is to a new year of health and happiness (boy, do we need it)!



Slowly but surely we are finding our way through the pandemic to help the community around us. Though many pantries and resources remain closed, we continue to find ways to give back. Many of you have helped arrange food for frontline workers, and many assisted our CTJ members through this challenging time with the Chesed Committee. Some found ways to help neighbors through nextdoor.com. Knitzvot knitters continue to produce hand-crafted pieces to provide comfort to those in need as cooler days approach. Project Needs has resumed hot meals to go, so we have gone back to monthly meatloaf preparation.

We were able to organize a "socially distanced" blood drive with Cedars Sinai Bloodmobile and a parking lot "essentials" drive. We were able to completely fill the blood drive sign-up schedule and successfully collect 30 units of blood. Through this collection drive we were able to provide cleaning supplies, 2 trash bags full of toiletries, several cases of toilet paper, and a case of about 20 lbs of peanut butter to Project Needs. We were able to help out with several bags of new and gently used professional attire for a Jewish Federation Volunteer Collective Project. But as the number of homeless continues to surge in the LA areas, we decided to make a big push to give to the community taking care of this vast and vulnerable population. We were able to deliver over 700 pounds (yes about 4 industrial bins full) of clothing, toiletries, food, towels, bedding, and other household items to the downtown Los Angeles Mission.

As we rapidly approach these Days of Awe, we are sadly unable to hold the traditional High Holiday food drive or the Jewish Community "Building Shelter for Sukkot" project with Habitat for Humanity. However, that will not stop us. On (DATE), please consider giving blood with Cedars Sinai Bloodmobile (SIGNUP) and sharing your

generous contributions of non-perishable food, toiletries, household needs, baby needs, and clothing so we may distribute again through these wonderful and worthy organizations on the front lines.

And as you enter this new year, think about what more you can do. Please let the office or Hildy Stern (hildy.stern@ gmail.com) know if you are able to help out with CTJ's Chesed Community. Or let the office or Laura Pinsky (laurap4rbiz@verizon.net) know if you would like to get involved knitting for a cause with Knitzvot. Jewish World Watch was unable to Walk to End Genocide this year, but still needs you support, ask Gwen.Wexler@ctimb.orgcom how you can help. What is better than a great ghost story for scaring children around a campfire? How about Hebrew School horror stories? Most of us have them. One of mine involves maps - many, many maps. In fifth grade our teacher gave us new maps nearly every week of Israel or of the Middle East. He would provide us with one filled out map of whatever the area of the week was and several blank ones and we'd copy the countries and cities onto blank maps over and over as we attempted to memorize them.

Every couple of weeks we'd have a test. On test days we'd be handed a blank map and expected to fill it in from memory. Because I took all school seriously, the tests caused great anxiety for me and I spent hours at home filling out blank maps to practice. When I wasn't stressing about tests I was bored by the tedious chore of filling out maps. And the worst part? The year of alternating between stress and boredom was worthless, as I could only remember the geography of the region long enough to take the test. Today, I couldn't fill out a map of the Middle East if you paid me.

A teacher who worked for me a few years back told this story from her days growing up at a congregation right here in the LA area:

When I was in Hebrew school if you forgot your pencil, you had to give the education director one shoe in exchange for a pencil. At the end of class, you gave her back the pencil and she gave you back your shoe. Except one time she brought her dog to work and her dog tore my shoe apart. Since I lived walking distance to the synagogue, I had to walk home from Hebrew school wearing only one shoe.

AT CTJ's Ohren Education Center, we are working hard to make sure your kids do not repeat these experiences. Our teachers try to make the material engaging and to vary activities for different learning styles. This year our students in grades K-6 will explore how Jewish values and thought can help create coping skills and build resilience in challenging times. They will do this through discussion, art, writing, role play, interviewing family and friends, and so much more! Our 7th graders will explore Jewish History and what we can learn from our foundational stories and from our ancestors. In addition, they will study Torah and discover how its teachings can inform our choices in positive ways in the present day.

You can help us to make the experience better for your kids by NOT sharing your Hebrew School horror stories with them. Sharing your tale of woe sets their expectations low and as you know we often see what we expect to see. Please help us keep expectations high by talking to your kids about the fun and engaging things they are doing in their classes which you'll read about in emails home each week. When you want to scare them, pick up a copy of "Scary Stories to Tell in the Dark" by Alvin Schwartz. In return I promise to never take away your child's shoe even when we're back in the building!

CTJ RECEIVED A GRANT FROM THE JEWISH FEDERATION OF GREATER LOS ANGELES!

CTJ is thrilled to announce that we have received a grant from the Jewish Federation of Greater Los Angeles to help keep our congregants safe from Covid-19 when we are able to reopen.

As part of its COVID-19 Response Plan, the Federation has provided critical support to 50+ Jewish organizations across LA through the CARES Fund: Careful Agency Reopening and Educational Safety Fund, a \$1,000,000 program to help organizations serving youth manage the costs of reopening operations in compliance with COVID-19 regulatory requirements. CTJ is happy to report that we have received some of these funds to help with the purchase of masks, gloves, and face shields, cleaning equipment, plexiglass barriers, and hand sanitizer stations. Although CTJ is not permitted to hold indoor services now, per Los Angeles County guidelines, we know the costs of re-opening will be substantial and we are grateful to have received funds to help offset these costs.

The Jewish Federation of Greater Los Angeles works to identify and address the greatest challenges and opportunities in Los Angeles, Israel and around the world. Since the onset of Covid-19, our Federation has been steadfast in its commitment to addressing our community's shortand long-term challenges. From providing essential resources for those most in need to increasing cash assistance funds to keeping our community connected, The Jewish Federation is playing an essential role in the rebuilding of our beloved Jewish LA.
